

Corn Marigold



Corn Marigold (*Glebionis segetum*) flowers from June to October with a large bright yellow daisy-like flower head. The leaves are hairless and covered with a waxy layer which gives them a green/blue colour. The stems are upright and branched, with a single flower at the end of each branch.

Most often found as a weed but can also be found on sites such as rubbish tips, road verges and over grazed pastures. Prefers well drained, sandy, loamy, and clay soils. Corn Marigold is usually easy to establish and is the ideal wildflower for beginners. Deheading regularly will help to prolong the flowering season.

Sowing Time: Spring/Autumn
